In addition to maternity education and consultation, The Osteoporosis Clinic and the Joyce Schwandt Library, our new easy-to-find location has a patient-friendly atmosphere and provides quick access to the Convenient Care Pharmacy. (The Women's Center Breast Care Clinic remains in Cox Medical Plaza II offering screening and diagnostic services.)

Among the services provided by The Women's Center is the Special Delivery maternity program. This program is designed to meet the needs of the entire expectant family with everything from prepared childbirth classes, preconception classes and breastfeeding classes to sibling and grand-parenting classes.

Also located in The Women's Center is our Osteoporosis Clinic. Opened in 1996, The Osteoporosis Clinic provides individualized risk assessments, diagnosis of osteoporosis with dual-energy bone densitometry, interpretation by a physician certified in bone density testing and individualized education by a registered nurse. Since its inception, more than 7,000

scans have been performed at The Osteoporosis Clinic. And soon we will purchase a new stateof-the-art bone densitometer, made possible through the generosity of the Cox Health Systems Auxiliary.

The yearly traditions at The Women's Center include the Special Delivery Baby Affair and the Pickles and Ice Cream

Luncheon. In October we put a special focus on breast cancer and breast cancer awareness with the annual Pink Ribbon Rally, the Pink Ribbon Luncheon and the Ozarks Women's Links Golf Tournament.

Although our location has changed, our commitment to being a health resource for women and their families has not changed.
